
## **Makers Market November 27:**

# The Low Head Community Garden:



The East Tamar Men's Shed was approached in August 2021 by Kathy Flood, the Co-ordinator for Low Head Community Garden, to make some raised garden beds to go into a block of land allocated by Georgetown Council. We accepted the project which consisted of a hexagonal centre garden surrounded by six trapezoid gardens making a total diameter of 8.4 metres. The project was designed and coordinated by John Moody who has worked tirelessly building an organising an assembly production line of some dedicated members.


Kathy supplied used fence palings which were recycled by some members cutting them to size then passing them onto others to coat with a preservative and then given to another team to do the final assembly. Treated pine was used to make capping boards and split logs were used as posts.



Contributing members were invited guests at the opening and the end result was greatly appreciated by the organisers of the garden at Low Head.

The garden is in a council car park being developed just a little inland from the Lagoon Beach reserve. It's worth a look if you are in the area. A great job John Moody and his team!

# Profile of George Murray, the President of ETMS



George was born in 1947 to Charlotte and George.

He is the younger of two boys having a brother 9 years his senior who still lives in Scotland. When

His next job was working on the British nuclear submarine program.

Uralla gets down to -14 degrees, so we find him living in Sidmouth with his wife Jean and springer spaniel Libby and an assortment of chooks!

His work history is also equally varied as he has been a satellite tracking technician, owned a cleaning contracting business, and working as a fitter and maintenance.

He has an interest in astronomy and is also interested in genealogy and has traced back to a Gt.Gt.Gt.Gt. Grandmother born in 1792 in the

Scottish Highlands. George and his wife were keen Line Dancers and have won medals in tournaments (a gold and a silver).

Despite living in Australia longer than he has in his country of birth, Scotland, George still has not managed to speak Australian.

After several years getting his house and garden into shape, he noticed he was living a rather unsocial life so decided to "reach out" and join the East Tamar Men's Shed (which just goes to show you don't have to live on the East Tamar to be a member).

During his first year as president, George has demonstrated his commitment to ensure the ongoing viability of the Shed and build on the success of the first 9 years. His skills and experience with machines have made him part of the "fix it" team, chief knife and tool sharpener, as well as becoming involved in many of the projects commissioned and for sale to raise funds for the Shed.
